Option 2 Two Languages

Global Studies majors may, with approval of the school, design a Modern Language program that combines two languages. Students have the option of taking courses in two languages offered at SDSU with coursework in one language through the intermediate level (201 and 202) and in the second language through the introductory level (101 and 102). Another option is for students to combine coursework in one of the languages offered at SDSU through the intermediate level (201 and 202) with coursework in a less commonly taught language (e.g., Arabic, Chinese, Japanese, Russian, etc.) through the introductory level (101 and 102 or the equivalent). This option, including an assessment plan, must be approved in advance by the School.

The School of American and Global Studies and the Global Studies program therein are updating the list of electives to the Global Studies major by adding, deleting, and changing the prefix of courses based upon updates by contributing programs. GER 434, GLST 125, and HIST 312 have not been taught for several years and are no longer offered. GER 435, GER 454, and GER 455, as well as HIST/POLS 381 and HIST 445 are courses actively taught by faculty in those programs, and given their contemporary global importance, they are great course options to add to the elective lists for GLST majors with no extra cost to the university.

The additional wording added under Modern Language requirement Option 1 serves to clarify that students must acquire the 202 and below language credits no matter where they begin their language program based upon placement. If a student, for example, places at the 202 level and begins their program there, they are still required to acquire the credits for 101-201. That had been the intent of the major all along, reflected in its original program proposal.
